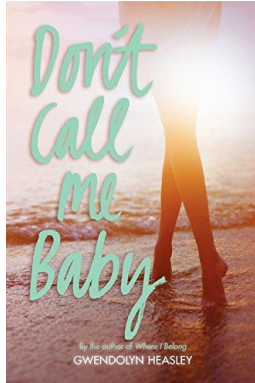

Fifteen-year-old Imogene, better known as Babylicious to the fans of her blogger mother, has never known privacy.

MommyliciousMeg.com's following is legendary, and its content is a full-on embarrassing documentation of her life from birth to first period. Best friend Sage, meanwhile, is the daughter of a vegan blogger who takes her daughter to task for her toxic eating habits. To make matters worse, the girls' yearlong English assignment is to create and maintain their *own* blogs—though soon they see it as a way to let their mothers know that enough is enough. Through trial and error, schemes, and disagreements, Imogene and Sage wage the fight to be heard. With humorous, clear-eyed prose, Heasley looks at how parents and teens interpret one another's motives and actions, and presents varying viewpoints about the Internet and personal privacy. Without preaching, she challenges her characters and readers to ask how much is too much, and when do we cross the line when others are involved. — *Jeanne Fredriksen*
